respective Chairmen/Members of the Committees are submitted to Central Pollution Control Board immediately which should then be paid by Central Pollution Control Board without any delay.

Further, we direct that the Central Pollution Control Board and the various State Boards in consultation with the Municipal Corporations and the Local Authorities to identify the villages near the industrial clusters or even otherwise, where in pursuit of corporate social responsibility, the industries paying environmental compensation are directed to construct toilets which are in villages nearby and locality specific. We also direct the South Delhi Municipal Corporation, East Delhi Municipal Corporation and North Delhi Municipal Corporation to submit list of the unauthorized colonies where there is shortage of toilets and people are indulging in open defecation. They will identify places particularly adjacent to railway tracks and flood plains of river Yamuna where such toilets can be provided to ensure that there is no open defecation in these areas.

The Central Pollution Control Board along with the local authorities and industries/industrial clusters who are liable to pay environmental compensation shall construct or provide such toilets in the specified colonies. Such toilets will be maintained by the respective local Corporations. The Tribunal would consider, request of the industry to perform this duty in discharging their corporate social responsibility rather than just depositing money with the Central Pollution Control Board and the State Pollution Control Boards.

All the State Boards are directed to submit their

plan for spending the remaining 75% of money, that the Boards have received under the orders of the Tribunal, with regard to environment protection and taking of such measures which will prevent and control pollution on the precautionary principle.

The Tribunal has passed decree on 23<sup>rd</sup> August, 2016 in the Original Application No. 24 of 2011 titled as Samir Mehta Vs. UOI & Ors. for a sum of Rs. 100 Crores in favour of Govt. of India which has not been executed so far.

The Learned Counsel appearing for the respondents submit that they are examining as to how decree can be executed against the foreign companies and they pray for further time. Let some positive steps be taken for execution of the decree.
